Malawi: Malawian radio to offer 24-hour election news coverage; rebroadcast poll results

Malawian voters go to the polls on 19 May to elect the next president and 193 parliamentarians. Privately-owned independent Capital FM radio is among a host of electronic media houses that has been accredited to rebroadcast poll results to be announced by the Malawi Elections Commission. The station will, from 19 May, provide 24 hours special live coverage of the elections with live news, reports, interviews and commentaries. The coverage on the general elections will begin at 8 p.m. local time [1800 gmt] on the day.

Malawi: Zodiak Radio appointed Malawi's elections broadcaster

The Electoral Commission (EC) of Malawi has appointed Zodiak Broadcasting Station (ZBS) as the country's official independent broadcaster for the 19 May, 2009 elections.

In the past, the state-owned Malawi Broadcasting Corporation (MBC) has been the official broadcaster for the elections, but in this year's elections political parties vehemently refused EC to allow MBC take up this task and, after endless meetings between the opposition, electoral stakeholders and government, ZBS was chosen.

Although there are seven presidential candidates, there is a tight two-horse race between opposition leader John Tembo who is contesting on the Malawi Congress Party (MCP) and incumbent President Dr. Bingu wa Mutharika who is running for the Democratic Progressive Party (DPP).

Mutharika will be riding on the back of his economic success where he has achieved economic growth rates of over 7% per annum for the past three years. On the other hand, Tembo has been trying to use the 13 years he was Reserve Bank governor in the single party government of the late Dr. Hastings Kamuzu Banda when Malawi kwacha was equivalent to US\$2.

Nigeria: Regulator keeps Adaba FM off-air despite court ruling

The National Broadcasting Commission (NBC), at the weekend, told the management of the suspended Adaba FM radio station in Akure, Ondo State that the station cannot be reopened. The commission, in a statement, said that the ex parte order of the court secured by the radio station states that both parties should maintain the status quo. The statement which was signed NBC's head of public affairs, Mr. Awwalu Salihu, explained that since the Federal High Court Akure's ex parte order stated that both parties should maintain the status quo, the station cannot be reopened.

The ex parte order, which was issued on Tuesday, 12 May, 2009, according to the NBC, indicated that the status quo as at the time the order was given must be maintained. "The Commission drew the attention of the Adaba FM to the fact that the portion of the ruling directing the "status" as at the date the ruling was delivered, and not "ante", i.e. before the ruling".

The commission had fined the radio station, asking it to pay N500, 000 for contravening the rules of election coverage in the Ekiti State governorship rerun election. On Monday, 11 May, 2009, the

station's license was suspended upon its failure to pay the stipulated fine.

Malawi: Radio Shut Down And Staff Arrested for Election Coverage

Reporters Without Borders expressed its concern after the closure yesterday of privately owned opposition Joy Radio and the arrest of four staff, two of them journalists, accused of breaking election rules.

The director of the Malawi Communications Regulatory Authority (MACRA), James Chimera, ruled that satirical programme, Chilungamo Chili Kuti? (Is there any justice?), broadcast at 2am after the closure of the official election campaign, had violated the law banning endorsement or ridicule of a candidate.

Some 15 police officers raided the studios at around 4am and arrested the two journalist presenters Aubrey Nazombe and Mary Chande Mhone, technician, Abdulazagv Telera, and a driver, Yusuf Yasin, accusing them of "violating electoral law". They also seized the tape of the programme.

Although the radio apologised and admitted making a mistake, the authorities initially banned all live programmes and ordered it to only play music. During the evening they decided to shut down the radio completely. "Police are watching the studios of Joy Radio and preventing anyone from entering" said Lloyd Zawansa, the station's editor. The four staff are still being held by police and are undergoing interrogation.

"The authorities who already disliked Joy Radio for its political coverage are now openly hounding it, the worldwide press freedom organisation said. "This incident shows the lack of respect for diversity of opinion and raises serious doubts about objective and balanced news coverage."

"Even if the radio did not obey the rules, the arrest of four of its staff and its closure are disproportionate. We urge the authorities to immediately release these four and to allow Joy Radio to resume its normal programmes."

Malawi: Police questions three pro-opposition radio journalists over broadcasts

The Malawi Police Service has picked up for questioning three broadcasters working with privately-owned Joy Radio, which owns to the family of ex-President Bakili Muluzi, following allegations they continued to camping for the opposition United Democratic Front-Malawi Congress Party alliance even after the close of the campaign period at 0400 gmt on 17 May.

According to privately-owned Capital Radio, the journalists are Aubrey Nazombe, Abdul Razak Terera [phonetic] and Mercy Mhone.

On 18 May, the chair of the Malawi Elections Commission, Justice Anastasia Msosa, told political parties to respect the constitutionally established 48-hour campaign free period preceding the 19 May general elections and remove all campaign materials within a radius of 100 meters from polling stations failure to which they would face the law.

Ghana: Regional foundation to launch training for journalists in Ghana

The Media Foundation for West Africa (MFWA) and the Ghana Journalist Association (GJA) are collaborating to launch a special training programme for journalists, known as the "Ghana Media Standards Improvement Project" (GMSIP).

The two-year pilot project, sponsored by the Royal Danish Embassy in Accra, will principally involve selected newspapers and rural-based radio stations.

A statement issued by the MFWA in Accra yesterday [20 May] said the date of the launch would be announced soon.

Among other objectives, the GMSIP conduct a research to assess public attitudes to, and perceptions of Ghanaian media. It will also organize training to improve standards and to support the media's capacity for sustainability in a difficult market environment.

The project hopes to help achieve great improvement in the media's performance, notably in the areas of investigative journalism, the analysis of critical issues, and also promote its sustainability.

Somalia: Journalist Killed in Fighting Between Government Forces And Islamist Militants

Reporters Without Borders expressed dismay at the death today of journalist Abdirisak Warsameh Mohamed, of Radio Shabelle, who was shot as the Somali army launched a major offensive against Islamist "al-Shabab" insurgents in the heart of the capital Mogadishu. [...]

"This latest tragic death underlines the extent to which civilians are exposed to an extremely volatile and alarming situation. Even when not deliberately targeted, Somali journalists have no protection from the ferocity of the fighting in the country".

Warsameh Mohamed was shot several times in the chest close to Bakara market in the south of the capital, which is the fiefdom of al-Shabab. Head of Radio Shabelle, Mukhtar Mohamed Hirabe, said he was shot while on his way to the station, as he crossed a road near Wardhigley police station. His body was left lying where it fell for almost an hour because nobody dared approach due to the intensity of the fighting.

Somali government forces have launched an offensive against three districts of the capital held by al-Shabab fighters - Tarbunka, Bakara and Howlwadag. There is nothing so far to suggest that the journalist was targeted because of his work. He may well have simply been hit by stray bullets as has happened to many civilians during these clashes.

Somali HornAfrik radio back on air via satellite

BBC Monitoring normally receives HornAfrik radio via satellite. After being off air via satellite for a few days now, HornAfrik radio resumed on 25 May. However, when it was off air via satellite, it could still be heard locally on FM in Mogadishu.

Meanwhile, the station's web site, which had been experiencing technical problems for several days, is now back up, but with a new address, www.hornafriknews.com, instead of its previous one, www.hornafrik.com.

The web site's been updated with news on the current situation in Somalia, including the situation of the capital, Mogadishu, where clashes between government forces and insurgents have intensified.

Zimbabwe: Children's Radio Discussion Programme Launched

The voiceless seems to have finally found a voice following the launch of an interactive 52-week radio programme by the National Action Plan for Orphans and other vulnerable children.

The programme series, entitled "Inzwi Redu/Ilizwi Lethu/Our Voice", would be aired every Thursday on Radio Zimbabwe.

The nation-wide radio series, which would be aired between 1630 and 1700hrs, aims to reach at least 200 000 orphans and other vulnerable children in Zimbabwe with comprehensive, life-saving and life-enhancing information and skills that will contribute towards their development.

The programme will be a studio-based discussion between a grandmother, "Gogo", and children which will see two children every week read a story after which "Gogo" will ask them questions on what they would have learnt.

Issues that the producers will look at would include those around HIV and Aids, life skills, access to basic services and psycho-social support, among others.

Information on the programmes would be tailored towards the general development of the children, breaking the vicious cycle of vulnerability and HIV transmission at the same time enhancing the children's personal survival.

Children at home will also have an opportunity to participate in the programme through letter writing, phone-ins, and competition prizes.

On different programmes technical experts would be called in every four weeks to discuss issues raised in previous programmes so as to encourage young listeners as well as caregivers, programmers, and other adults, to share what they would have learnt in previous weeks.

The interactive series will be broadcast in Shona and Ndebele and will run for a year.

Malawi: Malawi's privately-owned Joy Radio's future still uncertain

Joy Radio remains off air but its two presenters Aubrey Nazombe and Mary Chande were released on bail on Friday [22 May] last week.

The two were charged with campaigning outside the official campaign period.

The Presidential and Parliamentary Elections Act prohibits [broadcasting of campaign material] after the official campaign period.

The two were arrested on Tuesday [19 May] following the airing of a programme called Chilungamo chili kuti on the eve of the elections [18 May].

Meanwhile, staff members are still being denied entry into the station premises, an action police said it is aimed at preventing interference with their investigations.

Head of News and Current Affairs Lloyd Zawanda said in an interview on Monday [25 May] that it was only him and the acting station manager, Mabvuto Chapuma, who were allowed entry into the yard.

Chief Elections Officer David Bandawe said the commission has not been communicated on any development but said it is illegal for anyone to campaign after the official period.

Malawi Communications Regulatory Authority (Macra) spokesperson said they have asked Joy Radio to put their concerns in writing and they will act on the same.

Malawi: Malawi's broadcasting regulator advertises for TV, radio applications

The Malawi Communications Regulatory Authority -MACRA- has published an advertisement in the local press calling on eligible and suitably qualified persons and companies to apply for broadcasting licenses.

This is the second time MACRA is calling for applications for broadcasting licenses, after it did so on 2 February 2009.

According to the advertisement, the following types of broadcasting licenses shall be issued to eligible applicants: Private national sound broadcasting service licence, private national television broadcasting service licence, community sound broadcasting service licence in respect of any district in Malawi and private regional television broadcasting service licence in respect of any region in Malawi

The advertisement further said application forms can be obtained at MACRA offices at a fee of 2,000 Kwacha (14 US dollars). [...]

Meanwhile, MISA Malawi has commended MACRA for showing interest and trying to promote media diversity and pluralism by calling for applications from individuals and institutions to apply for broadcasting licenses.

MISA Malawi acting national director Sangwani Mwafulirwa says the move taken by MACRA will ensure that people are given an opportunity to make informed decisions by listening to various radio stations and watching TV stations of their choice.

Namibia: DTA Vexed With Inequitable Political Coverage On NBC

The DTA [opposition party] is accusing the Namibian Broadcasting Corporation of "unfair treatment and poor journalism ethics" because of its coverage of opposition parties.

In an open letter addressed to Matthew Gowaseb, the new acting Director General of NBC, DTA Secretary General McHenry Venaani complained that despite several calls over the past six years for more equitable news coverage of opposition party rallies, the NBC has failed to make any improvement.

He blasted the national broadcaster for taking almost a month to air news on the party's commemoration of the assassination of Chief Clemens Kapuuo at Okakarara; failing to cover a rally at Katima Mulilo on May 9, with the excuse that the comments of the party's president, Kaura, "must be further investigated"; and showing up an hour and a half late to cover a rally at Okandjengedi on Sunday, therefore having to do an interview instead of covering the event itself. [...]

He also called on the Media Institute of Southern Africa (MISA) "to closely monitor this sour state of events" at NBC.

Kenya: Kenya Broadcasting Corporation faces massive debt

According to a forensic audit report tabled in parliament, the treasury owes KBC Sh3.3 billion in arrears, having defaulted in funding the state broadcaster since the 2004 introduction of performance contracts in 2004. These contracts encourage self-sustainability.

Information and Communication Assistant Minister George Kahaniri however says: "KBC is not insolvent yet." The government is itself grappling with a Sh38 billion budget deficit. [...]

Gambia: Public Radio and Television Services launch on satellite

The Gambian President, His Excellency Professor Alhaji Dr Yahya Jammeh, has lauded a US\$9.5 million project that saw the national broadcasting services, the Gambia Radio and Television Services (GRTS), go on satellite. The ceremony was held at GRTS' head office in Kanifing. In a statement read on behalf of President Jammeh, Haja Dr Isatou Njie-Saidy, Vice President and Secretary of State for Women's Affairs, described it as an important milestone project in the journey to develop The Gambia.

"The digitalization of GRTS and the introduction of satellite broadcasting has always been my personal ambition which has finally come to fruition today. My passion in this project lies not only in the immeasurable and diverse opportunities it provides to The Gambia in its drive to be reckoned with among the comity of nations, but also in the opportunities it provides for Gambians in the Diaspora and non-Gambians alike to get direct access to accurate information on The Gambia," President Jammeh noted.

For many people, he went on, such projects are considered ideal and possible only for the rich and more powerful economies. Bigger and more robust economies have not been able to achieve digitalization even though their national TVs have been in existence longer than GRTS which came into being in December 1995."

President Jammeh spoke at length on the potentials of satellite broadcasting and the opportunities it would offer The Gambia. He further observed that the signals from the satellite that would be received throughout Africa, Europe, the Middle East and most parts of the Americas, will place The Gambia on the international super-highway for enhanced news and information broadcasting.

"For GRTS, the sky will continue to be the limit. The next phase of the project which is currently ongoing will complete the switch-over process from the current analogue to the new and advanced digitalized broadcasting technology and expanding this to the terrestrial transmission network," Professor Jammeh revealed.

DRCongo: Report says 20 radio stations operating "illegally" in eastern DRCongo

Over 20 private radio stations are broadcasting illegally in Nord-Kivu [eastern DRCongo], according to findings from public institutions in Goma. As a result, the Treasury is short of more than 600,000 dollars, but also, a dangerous product for consumption (information) is available to the public, radiookapi.net said.

The broadcasting stations in Nord-Kivu are exactly 35 in number. Some of them have been broadcasting for over 10 years, others for only a few months. However, besides the official radio, the RTNC [Congolese National Radio and Television], only seven among them have official documents or 20 per cent only, said official sources.

For Florent Babi, a journalist in Goma, it is the government which has not implemented rigorously the media law in DRCongo.

On its part, the officials in charge of private media have recognized its lack of order, but they have showed eagerness to redress the situation. They have said however, that the government should support them, considering particularly, the services they render to the population.

Magloire Paluku, head of Radio Kivu One, which has set up in Goma for only six months said: "I have to pay more or less 60,000 dollars and we do not make 60,000 dollars in six months.

Normally I should have a subsidy from government. I am not justifying the non-payment but I am stating what is happening".

Regardless, the private radio sector of has to be improved in Nord-Kivu, said Roger Kahindo Muhsa, former head of provincial division for information and media.

On their side, the media officials in the province are said to have sent already the list of radios broadcasting illegally to DGRAD [General Directorate for Administrative, Judicial, Property and Share Revenues], which has a right to take coercive measures.

Angola: Angolan government replaces state radio, TV boards appoints commissions

The Ministry of Social Communications has replaced the board of directors of the Angolan state-owned television (TPA) and the radio broadcast stations (RNA) by two technical restructuring commissions, under its restructuring and financial cleansing programme for the public media organs.

According to a press note that reached Angop today [30 May], the ministry has also appointed interim executive commissions to run the current affairs of the two media stations.

The commissions integrate officials and technicians of the ministries of social communication and economy and consultants to draft the functional, administrative, financial and news production restructuring.

The RNA executive commission is chaired by Filipe Diatezwa and includes Perpetua Cabral and Candido Rocha Pinto, while Bartolomeu Sacramento chaires the technical restructuring commission with Filipe Diatezwa and Laizaro Paulo.

The TPA executive commission is chaired by Helder Barber and includes Gil de Almeida and Susana Mata and the technical restructuring commission, chaired by Sergio Neto, includes Helder Barber and Welwitchia dos Santos.

The restructuring takes place under the Government's general programme for 2009/12 and the 2009 national plan which schedule of the main measures of macro-economic and structural management were approved by the Council of Ministers.

Nigeria: Commercialization of Nigerian state broadcasters, news agency "being sabotaged"- paper

Anichebe [head of public communications for the Bureau of Public Enterprises (BPE)] said that the commercialisation of four government-owned organisations were being sabotaged by their managements. They include Nigeria Television Authority (NTA), Federal Radio Corporation of Nigeria (FRCN), News Agency of Nigeria (NAN) and Nigeria Film Corporation.

"Our investigations clearly showed that the managements were reluctant in providing the consultant information that would enable BPE formulate policies on management and financial capacity," Anichebe said.

NAN recalls that the National Council on Privatisation (NCP), had at its 55th meeting on September 2008, approved BPE plans to divest Federal Government holdings from about 105 business concerns.

South Africa: Now Showing - Fear And Loathing in Auckland Park

It is business as usual at the SABC yesterday — or at least, business as it has become over the past few months. Faces were solemn. Employees refused point-blank to talk to a journalist about life in Auckland Park — and who can blame them when the climate of fear is so palpable?

The SABC board had just received a tongue-lashing from Communications Minister Simphiwe Nyanda, who said he was concerned about the "negative public perception" of the board and management.

Tomorrow, chairwoman Khanyi Mkonza is expected to face a call for her dismissal, and a protest march to the SABC's offices by contractors, trade unions and employees is planned. It seems these are the last days for an SABC board which has been in crisis since it first took office in January last year.

In the canteen at Radio Park, the situation was somewhat tense when this journalist visited during lunch yesterday.

And the same story is repeated, over and over: "Sorry, I can't talk to you. It's too dicey." [...]

The SABC has a multiyear agreement with its unions -- the Broadcast, Electronic Media and Allied Workers' Union , the Communication Workers' Union , and the Media Workers' Association of SA -- under which it is supposed to provide a 12,1% annual increase from April 1. The problem is, it can't afford to implement the increase all at once, although it is legally obliged to do so. The unions are determined to get their increase -- even if it means court action, or the threat of a strike.

The SABC's cash flow problems have meant that staff are uncertain whether they will receive their increase, or even whether they'll keep their jobs -- regardless of the official pronouncements, which now hold little water for the employees. [...]

Freedom of speech has become a luxury in an organisation which has a mandate to speak for the voiceless and dispossessed.
