16 JOURS POUR DENONCER LA VIOLENCE DE GENRE DANS LES MEDIAS

Du 25 novembre au 10 décembre, le réseau international des femmes de l'Association mondiale des radiodiffuseurs communautaire (AMARC-RIF) célébrera les 16 jours d'activisme contre la violence faite aux femmes avec une radiodiffusion sur l'Internet et ce, pour une deuxième année consécutive. Cette année le thème de la campagne est: "Demander la mise en œuvre, Défier les obstacles : Finissons-en avec la violence faite aux femmes".

La campagne couvrira trois dimensions : (a) Les médias en tant qu'instrument qui permet de combattre la violence contre les femmes. (b) La représentation de la violence contre les femmes dans les médias permettant de la banaliser ; (c) la violence contre les femmes que travaillent dans les médias. Les 16 jours de campagne commencent le 25 novembre : la journée internationale pour l'élimination de la violence faite aux femmes; le 29 novembre continuent par la journée internationale des femmes défenseures des droits humains des femmes; le 1er décembre avec la journée mondiale du SIDA; le 6 décembre, la commémoration du massacre de Montréal (Canada) en 1989 et le 10 décembre la journée internationale des droits humains.

Les producteurs de radio communautaire consacreront ces 16 jours pour accentuer l'effort des femmes et des hommes qui travaillent pour mettre fin à la violence faite aux femmes. Les programmes incluront des documentaires, des entrevues, des discussions, de la poésie, de la musique et beaucoup plus. [...] Les stations de radio communautaire de partout sont invitées à télécharger les programmes audio versés sur le site Web de l'AMARC consacré au 16 jours d'activisme et de les diffuser pendant les 16 jours de la campagne.

16 DAYS BROADCAST CAMPAIGN TO DENOUNCE GENDER VIOLENCE IN THE MEDIA

From November 25 to December 10th, the Women's International Network of the World Association of Community Radio Broadcasters (AMARC-WIN) will highlight the 16 days of activism against gender violence with an Internet campaign to Denounce Gender violence in the media and transform media into a catalyst to end violence against women. The campaign will be broadcast at www.amarc.org/16jours

This years' international theme of the campaign is "Media and Violence Against Women". The campaign seeks to denounce gender violence in the media and will cover 3 dimensions: (a) Media as an instrument in combating violence against women. (b) Violence against women as projected in the media which "normalizes" violence; (c) violence committed against women media practitioners. The 16 days campaign starts on November 25th with the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women; it continues on November 29th with the International Women's Human Rights Defenders Day; followed by December 1: World AIDS Day; December 6: Commemoration day of the Montreal (Canada) Massacre in 1989 and ends with the December 10th: International Human rights Day.

Community radio producers from will dedicate these 16 days to highlight the effort of women and men working to put an end to gender violence. The programs featured will include documentaries, interviews, debates, poetry, music and much more. This multilingual broadcast campaign mobilizes community radios around a global issue and encourages them to use new communication technologies such as the Internet to extend the reach of their voices. Radio stations around the

globe are invited to download the audio files from the AMARC-WIN 16 days website and broadcast them in their radio stations.

The coordination of the 16 days campaign at the international level will be ensured by the International Secretariat of AMARC, contact Flor Maria Balbin secretariat(at)si(dot)amarc(point)org. Regionally, the campaign will be coordinated by the regional AMARC WIN representatives: West and Central Africa, Zara Yacoub myzara(at)intnet(dot)td; East and Southern Africa, Doreen Rukaria: rukdoreen(at)yahoo(dot)com.

Sudan: In South Sudan, Community Radio Provides a Voice for the Voiceless

Since Sudan's 22-year old civil war ended in 2005, news has been slow in coming to the most remote regions of the country. To provide news and information and give voice to thousands of Sudanese, Internews has built four community radio stations in South Sudan and is training nascent journalists to run them. [Internews is] also planning to build two more this upcoming year. "I love my radio station because it is contributing to the reconciliation of my community," says one of the new journalists at the latest station Internews has launched, in Kurmuk, South Sudan. The station, called 88 FM, went on the air last week after more than a year of hard work and intensive training. It is the only station in the Kurmuk region.

"We were able to send out a signal today when testing the transmitter, and I wish you could have

been able to see the excitement on everyone's face when they were listening to the station," said Sammy Muraya, a professional journalist from Kenya, who is working with the Kurmuk team to help launch the station. "I was walking with Dominic (the station manager) in the market here and he had borrowed a small radio and he made sure that he told everyone we met that the Kurmuk radio station was already on air. I have to say that the people up here have been waiting for so long for the station . . . everyone is so excited!"

88 FM in Kurmuk is part of Internews' project, "Radio for Peace, Democracy and Development in South Sudan", which began in 2006 through a grant from the US Agency for International Development. [...]

Malgré une connectivité améliorée, les radios Ouest-africaines peinent toujours à tirer profit des TIC" Les radios demeurent le médium de communication le plus approprié à la communication sociale et à la communication de développement en Afrique. Après deux premières enquêtes en 2001 et 2003, l'IPAO vient de réaliser une nouvelle étude sur les radios et les technologies numériques de communication. Guinea: Soap Operas "Wontanara"

Since August 2007, SFCG has collaborated with Guinea's national media institution, Radio Rurale Guinée produce and broadcast an increasingly popular soap opera entitled Wontanara (We are United). Wontanara represents an opportunity to mobilise public mass media in favor of social activism and public dialogue. Aired in N'Zérékoré in the Forest Region, the soap opera seeks to address sensitive issues such as refugee flows and ethnic tensions in a non-partisan and nonadversarial fashion. Many of these themes addressed by the soap are rarely discussed in Guinean media. Each episode is produced in French and reproduced in the area's two local languages, Malinké and Guérzé. The plot revolves around the daily lives of a group of characters who meet in a Conakry café and N'zérékoré to discuss the challenges they face and issues of importance to them. Wontanara has met with widespread praise among audience members because it is willing to take on tough issues in an entertaining way.

The Panos Institute West Africa (PIWA) launched a new publication on ICTs and radios. It presents the findings of a research on 220 radio stations in West Africa (seven target countries: Benin, Burkina Faso, Ghana, Mali, Niger, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Togo). The objectives of the research was to:

- a) Assess radio, the Internet and satellites in the sub-region, the use of tools such as mobile, CD-ROM, USB drives, and digital audio production software;
- b) Identify innovative uses combining new technologies and radios;
- c) Identify and analyze the constraints relating to the use of ICTs (internet, satellite, in particular) by radios;
- d) Identify capacity building needs.
- e) Lay down recommendations to the attention of various stakeholders.

Burkina Faso: Et les femmes créèrent Femina FM

L'univers médiatique s'élargit au Burkina Faso, avec la naissance d'une nouvelle station radiophonique, Femina FM, qui émet sur la fréquence 102.8. Les initiatrices de la « radio des femmes » ont présenté leur « maison » à la presse le jeudi 30 octobre 2008. Elle a commencé à émettre dans cette même soirée.

« La radio des femmes et de ceux qui les aiment », « la réalité au féminin », ce sont les deux slogans que Femina FM, compte utiliser pour conquérir la gent féminine et faire de leur média, une radio à laquelle « les femmes pourraient s'identifier ». Les sœurs Salembéré, promotrices de la radio, entendent aider les femmes à s'épanouir, grâce à une grille de programmes qui tient compte de leurs préoccupations. Les auditeurs pourront écouter des émissions qui traitent du quotidien de la femme burkinabé, de la santé maternelle et infantile, Des droits de la femme.

Ces émissions seront ouvertes aux associations et groupements féminins. Femina FM vient agrandir le cercle, de plus en plus grand, des radios commerciales au Burkina Faso. Elle a un rayon de couverture de 50 à 70 kilomètres et diffusera ses émissions en français et dans les langues nationales les plus parlées au Burkina Faso. Ayna Annick, la directrice, pense que des difficultés ne manqueront pas et se dit déterminée à les braver. « Que serait la vie sans challenge ? » a-t-elle lancé. Les promotrices ne cachent pas leur ambition, elles souhaitent déjà étendre les ondes de Femina FM sur d'autres villes comme Bobo Dioulasso et Koudougou.

DRCongo: Solar Radios for Women in South Kivu

Initiated by Dimitra (a project of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) working on gender, rural women, and development) and its local partner Sauti ya Mwanamke Kijjini (SAMWAKI), this initiative involves the distribution of solar radios to listeners' clubs and women's networks in eight rural districts within the province of South Kivu in the Democratic Republic of Congo. The aim of the project is to enable members of distant communities to share knowledge and experiences, in particular with respect to farming practices and HIV/AIDS. One key aspect of the project is that women are trained to use the solar radios and are put in charge of them. Under their supervision, the radios are then passed around from family to family, or listened to in a group situation.

Communication Strategies:

The solar radio project involved training listener's clubs and women's groups on the technical aspects of using the solar radios – how to tune them, adjust the volume, and change the frequency, as well as how to charge them, either with solar power or with a mechanical crank. Each of the groups rotates the radio amongst its members so that each member has the opportunity to use the radio and listen with their family, friends, and communities. According to the organisers, the availability of radios and the fact that women are in charge has made a significant difference in the lives of women and men in these communities. The reasons are as follows:

- * Gender balance - Previously in the area, men generally had control of the radios, and did not give women or young people access to them. With the solar radios given specifically to women and women's groups, the project intends to develop women's ownership of the radios, giving them the opportunity to decide what to listen to, when to listen, and with whom to listen.

- * Knowledge sharing - Having radios in the community gives individual women as well as listening groups access to existing radio programmes on agriculture and community development. According to the organisers, many of the groups and individuals have started up their own small-scale farming or micro-finance projects based on knowledge gained from radio programmes.

- * Breaking the silence around sensitive issues - According to the organisers, members have been able to use the radios to broach sensitive or difficult-to-talk-about topics such as HIV within their families. One member reported being able to bring the radio home and tune in to a programme on HIV. After listening to the programme, her family was able to discuss the issue more comfortably than if she had tried to bring up the subject on her own.

Uganda: Today You Will Understand: Women of Northern Uganda Speak Out<http://www.communit.com/en/node/275093/2754>

"Today You Will Understand" is a collection of 16 transcribed audio testimonies from women living in areas affected by the war between Ugandan government forces and the Lord's Resistance Army in Northern Uganda. Members of FEMRITE, the Uganda Women Writers Association, interviewed the women in January 2008, as part of a radio project with Integrated Regional Information Networks (IRIN) Radio. These true stories aim to reveal how war has impacted the lives of ordinary women, many of whom were displaced from their communities and now survive in camps for the internally displaced. The women and girls tell of being raped, shot, disabled, displaced, abused and enslaved, of witnessing their loved ones being killed in front of them, and being burdened with the responsibility of raising their children alone in poverty. According to FEMRITE coordinator Hilda Twongyeirwe, "Sharing and publishing these stories is one way of raising awareness about the atrocities of war and making the world reflect more closely on what happens in armed conflict." The booklet of transcribed testimonies is accompanied by an audio CD of the actual interview recordings, originally broadcast on local radio stations.

Kenya: The Standard Group is finally entering the radio market

Deputy Chairman and Strategy Adviser Paul Melly broke the news on Monday, disclosing that the Group was "at advanced stages of concluding negotiations that would lead to the acquisition of an entire interest of a company that holds radio frequencies covering most of the country".
 Melly said the Group planned to invest Sh250 million [NDLR: approx. 2,5 million euro] in the acquisition costs and the development of a robust infrastructure for the new venture in the next one and-a-half years. [...]
 Melly said the board decided on the venture as part of a growth and diversification strategy aimed at transforming the group into a leading multi-media house.
 The group has been desirous of entering the radio market, and already has a licence to broadcast but was being held back by the lack of frequencies. [...]
 The Standard Group publishes The Standard newspapers and operates Kenya's premier television station, KTN, besides distributing leading international newspapers and magazines under its Publishers Distribution Service (PDS) division. It also publishes online at www.eastandard.net. [...]
 The group has also invested in cutting-edge broadcast technology through the acquisition of a virtual studio and satellite mobile news gathering facilities.

[Français suit] Institute for War and Peace Reporting-Netherlands has launched a radio programme aimed at increasing public awareness in the Democratic Republic of Congo about war crimes trials taking place at the International Criminal Court, ICC, in The Hague.
 The fortnightly programme, Facing Justice, was broadcast for the first time in October in Lingala, Swahili and French. IWPR's partner is Search for Common Ground, which will distribute the programme via a network of more than 90 partner radio stations around the country.
 Facing Justice will draw on contributions from IWPR-trained journalists in DRC, staff at IWPR

Netherlands, legal experts, civil society, political analysts, human rights activists and government representatives.

"The aim of the programme is to help Congolese citizens understand and contextualise the role of international justice in their country by providing them access to a broad range of voices knowledgeable on questions of the ICC and the challenges that the DRC justice system faces," said Stephanie Wolters, producer of Facing Justice.

DRCongo: A Community Radio Broadcaster killed in North-Kivu

The International Federation of Journalist (IFJ) condemns the killing and kidnapping of journalists in Democratic Republic of Congo

The International Federation of Journalists (IFJ) today warned that journalists in Democratic Republic of Congo are facing extreme danger after Congolese journalist Alfred Nzongo Bitwahiki Munyamariza was killed in the town of Rutshuru and Belgian journalist Thomas Scheen was kidnapped nearby.

"Our colleagues covering the conflict in the Eastern part of the Democratic Republic of Congo are incredibly vulnerable to violence and abduction," said Gabriel Baglo, director of the IFJ Africa office. "We condemn the killing of our colleague Alfred and call on all the parties in conflict to respect the rights of journalists and to ensure that they are not targeted when they are reporting on the conflict. The IFJ is also urging Scheen's kidnappers to release him immediately."

Munyamariza, a 27-year-old journalist and presenter on community radio station Radio Communautaire Ushikira(Racou), was killed on Tuesday by a single bullet in Rutshuru during a stampede that followed the attack on the village of Kiwanja, according to reports. The journalist's killer is unknown and the victim's colleagues are still in hiding.

The Belgian foreign ministry said today that Scheen, a Belgian reporter working for the German newspaper, Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung, was kidnapped near Rutshuru on Tuesday by Mai Mai rebels, a pro-government militia in the Democratic Republic of Congo. According to reports, the Belgian ministry says it has started negotiations to secure Mr. Scheen's release.

"The conflict in the Democratic Republic of Congo has claimed many civilian victims," said Baglo. "Now the journalists who are attempting to report on this war are tragically finding themselves under attack."

Nigeria: Nigeria Rivers State government appoints new head of local broadcaster

In its drive to reposition the information sector, the Rivers state Government has appointed Mr Tonye Ekong as the new General Manager for Rivers State Television, [RSTV]. The State Commissioner for Information, Mr Ogbonna Nwuke who announced this in Port Harcourt recently, noted that the appointment of the new General Manager was based on merit.

He also said that the appointment takes immediate effect. Until this new appointment, Ekong, a one-time staff of Nigerian Television Authority (NTA), RSTV was run by an acting General Manager who stepped into the shoes of Mr Dagogo Ezekiel-Hart. It would be recalled that a few days ago, the state Governor, Rt. Hon. Chibuike Rotimi Amaechi had in the presentation of his account of stewardship explained that he was ready to reposition the ailing information sector of the oil rich state. Our Correspondent reports that the appointment of Mr Ekong may just be one of the steps taken by the government to revamp the parastatals under the state ministry of Information.

DRCongo: Journalist reportedly killed in fighting found alive

A Congolese journalist, reported to have been killed in fighting in eastern Democratic Republic of Congo, has been found alive and well, a free press campaign group said Friday.

New-York based Human Rights Watch had said Thursday that Alfred Munyamaliza Bitwahiki Njonjo had been killed at Kiwanja, 80 kilometres (50 miles) from Goma, the provincial capital of the troubled Nord-Kivu region.

But the Congolese group Journalists in Danger (JED) said Friday that they had spoken to Njonjo by telephone after he took refuge at a United Nations camp.

Human Rights Watch's senior Africa researcher Anneke Van Woudenberg said that the rights organization had received reports that Njonjo had been found safe and well. "We are checking to confirm this information," she said.

Guinea: Radio station suspended indefinitely

The National Communications Council (CNC), the media regulatory body in Guinea, on 4 November 2008 ordered the management of Familia FM, a community radio station in Conakry, to cease transmission for allegedly broadcasting information that the CNC claimed could "disturb the public peace" of the country.

The Media Foundation for West Africa's (MFWA) correspondent reported that following the directive, the station is now off the airwaves. A reporter for the station said they did not receive any written notice from the CNC, but heard of the suspension on the national radio station.

The correspondent said Mounir Camara, the CNC chairman, announced that Familia FM had been illegally operating outside its mandate as a community radio station and therefore he has withdrawn "the broadcasting license until further notice."

Familia FM is a popular private community radio station that specialises in social issues, but only has the right to broadcast news bulletins.

MFWA is worried about the tendency of the CNC to order suspensions of media outlets in Guinea. The Foundation calls on the CNC as a matter of urgency to lift the suspension, desist from misusing its powers and authority and ensure that the media in Guinea operate without interference.

Guinée: Une station de radio suspendue indéfiniment

Le 4 novembre 2008, le Conseil National de la Communication (CNC), l'organe de régulation des médias en Guinée, a ordonné à la direction de Familia FM, une radio communautaire basée à Conakry, de suspendre ses émissions pour avoir prétendument diffusé des informations qui, aux yeux du CNC, pourraient "troubler l'ordre public" du pays.

Le correspondant de la Fondation pour les Médias en Afrique de l'Ouest (MFWA) a rapporté que suite à cette directive, la station a maintenant cessé d'émettre. Un reporter de la station a indiqué que le CNC ne leur a transmis aucune notification écrite et qu'ils ont entendu à la radio que la station avait été suspendue.

Le correspondant a ajouté que Mounir Camara, le Président du CNC, a annoncé que Familia FM est passé en dehors des limites des attributions d'une radio communautaire. De ce fait, il a retiré "la licence de diffusion de l'information jusqu'à nouvel ordre".

Familia FM est une radio privée communautaire très écoutée qui a pour vocation de diffuser des émissions sur des sujets de société mais n'a le droit de diffuser que des bulletins d'information.

La MFWA s'inquiète du fait que le CNC a tendance à ordonner la suspension des médias en Guinée. Nous faisons appel à l'organe pour qu'il lève la suspension dans les meilleurs délais, cesse d'abuser de ses pouvoirs et de son autorité et assure plutôt que les médias opèrent sans ingérence.

Uganda: Karamoja Gets Radios<http://allafrica.com/stories/200811110513.html>

The Straight Talk Foundation, in partnership with the UN children's agency (UNICEF), has distributed 5,339 radios to the communities in Karamoja sub-region. Straight Talk project manager Martin Oenen said on Thursday that the organisation got concerned about the plight of communities in Karamoja and requested UNICEF for support. UNICEF sent the consignment.

Oenen said there was need to have the communities' capacity building strengthened by delivering adequate information on health and education, because the Karimojong have for so long been cattle-centred.

"We wanted the communities to be able to listen to programmes so that they can follow up the one-month child survival campaign which has been concluded," Oenen said.

UNICEF has been running a child survival campaign in the sub-region, which carried a holistic approach that encompassed children and mother survival.

Alisen Okot, 42, a resident of Loputuk village and a beneficiary of the radios, said she had heard a lot about several preventable diseases.

"I now spend most of my time hooked to the radio and I do not feel like drinking alcohol," Okot said.

UNICEF chief field officer Dr Narinder Sharma said the radio distribution was designed to expand the coverage of high impact and life-saving interventions for children and women in Karamoja.

"We have an enormous opportunity to make a big difference for Karamoja children by rapidly scaling up the major child survival interventions in the sub-region," Sharma said.

"Nearly 100 children under the age of five die every week from preventable causes in Karamoja. Therefore, there is need for concerted and sustained action to reduce disparities in the region which stem-up high levels of disease and death of children," he added. Sharma said UNICEF was already making gains in the sub-region alongside other partners.

L'Observatoire de la liberté de la presse en Afrique (OLPA), réseau africain d'experts juristes et journalistes volontaires pour la défense et la promotion de la liberté de la presse, informe l'opinion nationale et internationale que son département d'alerte vient de retrouver les traces d'Alfred Munyamaliza Njonjo, journaliste reporter à la Radio communautaire Ushirika (Racou), émettant à Kiwanja (localité située à 5 km de Rutshuru-centre, à plus ou moins 72 km au Nord de Goma, chef-lieu de la province du Nord-Kivu), en République démocratique du Congo, rappelle OLPA cité par societe civile.cd. Alfred Munyamaliza Njonjo, 25 ans, donné pour mort le 4 novembre 2008 lors de l'attaque de la localité de Kiwanja par des miliciens, est bel et bien vivant.

Il a échappé in extremis à la mort lorsque son domicile a été pris à partie par des tirs avant d'être consumé. Le reporter de Racou dit s'être sauvé alors que des éléments Mai-Maï du groupe des Patriotes résistants congolais (Pareco) rôdaient tout autour de sa maison, recherchant d'éventuels survivants à éliminer.

Dans la soirée du 7 novembre 2008, Alfred Munyamaliza Njonjo, qui vit en clandestinité depuis lors, était en compagnie de son directeur de rédaction, Faustin Tawite, dans la localité de Kiwanja. Des menaces de mort continuent à peser sur sa personne ainsi que sur les autres journalistes de Racou OLPA prend au sérieux ces menaces et les condamne, étant des atteintes graves à la liberté de la presse.

Ghana: Ministry mulls ban on radios that don't use "delay mechanism"

The Minister of Information and National Orientation Mr Stephen Asamoah Boateng says his ministry is in talks with the Attorney General's Department to ensure the banning of radio stations which operate without "delay mechanism" during live broadcasts.

He indicated that the delay mechanism would allow radio presenters to edit and help curb the problems of verbal abuses by callers to radio programmes and promote peace.

The minister was responding to appeals by some staff of the Adansi South District Assembly to his ministry to ban phone-in-segments on local radio stations in the name of peace during [the forthcoming presidential] election. Mr Asamoah Boateng was on a tour of parts of the Adansi South and North districts.

Zambia: Director of Radio Icengelo arrested

Zambian police have arrested a Roman Catholic priest in the middle of a live radio broadcast, according to reports on 13 November. The cleric, Father Frank Bwalya, is the station manager of Radio Icengelo, a Catholic Church owned FM station in the north central town of Kitwe.

Kitwe (also known as Kitwe Nkana) is the third largest city in Zambia and lies in the middle of the country's copper mining region.

ARREST

The station was said to have been running programmes critical of Zambia's hotly contested 30 October presidential election.

The poll was won by Rupiah Banda of the ruling Movement for Multiparty Democracy (MMD). He defeated Michael Sata of the opposition Patriotic Front (PF). Sata accused officials of rigging the poll.

It is the second time this month that police have raided the station. In the first incident, according to privately owned newspaper The Post on 3 November, officers acted after "receiving complaints from some MMD supporters who were unhappy with the way the station manager, Fr Frank Bwalya, was announcing election results". The police "cautioned and advised Fr Bwalya to stop making such announcements as he was likely to incite people to rise against the government".

The latest action comes as the PF plans demonstrations over the poll in the Copperbelt on 15 November, according to The Post.

Father Bwalya is not the only journalist to come under state sanction in the past month. [...]

Zambia: Radio station manager detained overnight, charged and released

On 13 November 2008, Fr Frank Bwalya, station manager of the Catholic radio station Radio Icengelo in Kitwe, was released from detention after a night at Kalulushi Police station and has been slapped with three charges for disturbing the country's peace as a result of a special post-election radio programme he has been running for two weeks.

In a phone interview with MISA Zambia on 13 November, Bwalya said that he was taken to the police and was asked to stop running the programmes but he refused, and hence the police charged him with the three violations.

"The police picked me up at the station and took me for questioning, they asked me to stop running the programme but I refused and decided I would remain there at the station. This forced them to lay three charges against me bordering on breaching [the] peace," Bwalya said.

The police recorded a warn and caution statement from Bwalya on 13 November and he will appear in court on 27 November.

Meanwhile, residents in Kitwe rioted after word went round that Bwalya had been arrested.

According to the "Zambia Daily Mail" of 14 November, 38 people were arrested by the riot police. The incident was confirmed by Police Commissioner Francis Kabonde, who was in the company of Copperbelt Police Chief Antonniel Mutentwa.

During the riot, several shops were destroyed in Kitwe and a baby was rushed to the hospital because of the effect of the tear gas fired by the police. Kabonde said the riot was caused by bus drivers who were honking and skidding their tires, causing hooligans to take advantage of the situation.

Kabonde told journalists that police had earlier warned Bwalya not to issue statements that were allegedly intended to promote hostility in communities.

Bwalya denied inciting people to riot but said people could do what they wanted to do with the truth. He said he had spoken alone on a live programme and said, among other things, that Zambia would never have a free and fair election if it maintained the electoral laws it has.

The police charged him with making statements that are likely to cause hostility between groups within the country. He was also charged for alleging that the elections were fraudulent. The third charge was based on his statement that President Rupiah Banda was not elected legitimately.

Bwalya accused the government of using the arrest as a suppression tool to control people's minds. "My arrest is a form of suppression of free minds. It's meant to make people quiet when wrong things are happening," he said and added that his detention was illegal.
